The Bible is not a story of man's search for God, but the account of God's search for man.

Overview: Understanding the Bible as a whole

The four chapters of the story:

- Creation
- Fall
- Redemption
- Consummation

Nature of Scripture

Because the Bible communicates God's word to us it is important to understand fundamental principles.

- 1. As "God's" message, it has eternal relevance and speaks to all humankind, in every age and every culture.
- 2. As the Word of God it must be understood and obeyed.
- 3. Each book of the Bible was written to a particular people during a particular historical period.
- 4. Interpretation requires understanding the "tension" between eternal relevance and historical particularity.

Exegesis: What did the text mean to its original hearers?

- Context: Historical and Literary
- Content: meanings of words, grammatical relationships, manuscripts

Hermeneutics: How is this meaning incorporated into today?
